Brig. Gen. Ronald J. Haeckel is Principal Assistant Deputy Administrator for Military Application, National Nuclear Security Administration, Department of Energy, Washington, D.C. As the senior military officer assigned to the NNSA, he ensures the administration provides safe, secure and reliable nuclear weapons to meet Department of Defense requirements; directs U.S. nuclear stockpile maintenance and support functions; and provides oversight for all defense programs within the DOE.

General Haeckel earned his commission as a distinguished graduate of the Reserve Officer Training Corps program at Parks Air College, III. His operational missile combat crew experience was in the Minuteman III Intercontinental Ballistic Missile weapon system. As squadron commander, the generals unit was the first to transition from the Minuteman II to the Minuteman III. He also commanded the first follow-on operational test and evaluation missile launch in Air Combat Command, and was president of Air Force Space Commands first Safety Investigation Board.



General Haeckel has served in a variety of space and missile staff tours at the Air Staff, major command and wing levels. As wing commander, his unit won the 1998 Omaha Trophy, the 1998 Williams Award and 2000 Blanchard Trophy, and, he and Mrs. Haeckel received AFSPCs OMalley Award in 2000.
